Governor Hochul Unveils Portrait Carving Immortalizing Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg in The New York State Capitol

On August 21, Governor Kathy Hochul officially unveiled a carving of Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court and Brooklyn native Ruth Bader Ginsburg on the New York State Capitol's Great Western Staircase. Justice Ginsburg's family was in attendance.

"Throughout her career, Ruth Bader Ginsburg served as a driving force for women's rights and tirelessly fought against gender discrimination," Governor Hochul said. "As the first woman to be elected as Governor of New York State, I join the ranks of millions of women inspired by Justice Ginsburg's wisdom and courage. Her portrait's presence in the Capitol will stand as a lasting reminder of her extraordinary legacy and New York State's forefront position in the movements for women's suffrage and rights."

Commissioner of the New York State Office of General Services Jeanette Moy said, "Justice Ginsburg believed that societal advances occur incrementally, saying 'real change, enduring change, happens one step at a time.' New York State took one of those impactful steps today when Governor Hochul unveiled this carving of Justice Ginsburg in a prominent location of the Capitol where only portraits of men existed until now. The OGS team is proud of the role we played in adding Justice Ginsburg's likeness to our state Capitol's Great Western Staircase."

In addition to the Ginsburg family, the carving's artist, sculptor Meredith Bergmann, was also in attendance. She stated, "I was honored to have been selected to sculpt the portrait of one of my heroes for this magnificent, idealistic staircase. Justice Ginsburg was a shining example of what a Supreme Court Justice could be, and now she can greet and inspire our lawmakers as they pass her on their way to work."

Justice Ginsburg's portrait is the first to be added to the Great Western Staircase since the completion of the steps in 1898 and only the seventh woman depicted in the staircase gallery. The second-floor location chosen for the carving places Justice Ginsburg in an area where only men were included before now.

The permanent sculpture of Justice Ginsburg is located directly above a carving of the U.S. Supreme Court's first chief justice John Jay, making Ginsburg only the second Supreme Court justice whose portrait is carved on the Great Western Staircase. Justice Ginsburg's likeness was created in the same style as the 19th-century portraits carved in the staircase's Corsehill sandstone.


In November 2022, the Ginsburg family approved figurative sculptor Meredith Bergmann's model of the proposed portrait carving. Bergmann is the female figurative artist who sculpted the Women's Rights Pioneers Monument in New

York City's Central Park, which features suffragists Sojourner Truth, Susan B. Anthony, and Elizabeth Cady Stanton.

The new portrait of Justice Ginsburg is best

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Latimer Unveils Dedication of Gorski Pond at Lasdon Park

Westchester County Executive George Latimer and the Friends of Lasdon Park unveiled the dedication of Gorski Pond in honor of Patricia Fitzgerald Gorski on August 25, at Lasdon Park and Arboretum in Katonah.

Patricia "Pat" Gorski had a lengthy and devoted career in public service with the Westchester County Board of Legislators. She began in 1977 as Secretary to the Clerk. In 1992, she was unanimously elected to the position of Clerk and Chief of Staff of the Board of Legislators, a position she held for six terms until her retirement in 2002.

Gorski began her career in Westchester's government in 1971 as a summer intern in the Department of Public Works. She moved on to the office of County Executive Edward Michaelian and then became the Secretary to the Commissioner of Social Services and the Secretary to the Commissioner of Finance.



In addition to being a devoted public servant, Pat was the loving wife of Walter Gorski, to whom she was married for almost 50 years. After retiring, the Gorskis strolled the paths at Lasdon Park several times a week. Their walks started on the woodland trails and extended across the fields, and always ended with them relaxing on the bench at the pond. Walter says it was Pat's "happy place," where she found peace and

Westchester County Executive George Latimer said: "I had the privilege of working with Pat at the Board of Legislators; she was a true friend. She was dedicated, fair, kind, and hardworking, as she was at all of her positions with the County. It is our pleasure to honor and memorialize Pat for all time at Lasdon Park."

Westchester County Parks Commissioner Kathleen O'Connor said: "Pat adored every job she had during her long career in public service for the County. Her love of Lasdon Park and her 'happy place' there made naming the pond after Pat an easy and appropriate choice."

She believed that every task, great or small, is an act of service and that every person, regardless of title, is worthy of equal respect. As we enter August, even more Villagers head off for vacation, leaving the Village the quietest of months.

Sadly, folks looking for less populated neighborhoods in which case find August the

As crimes are truly crimes of opportunity, make your home a non-tempting target.

The following are just a few less obvious methods of deterrence:

- Put timers on televisions as well as lights.
- Have neighbors park their car in your driveway.
- Trim trees and shrubs before departing to avoid creating a convenient screen for intruders.
- If an apartment dweller, phone ringers should be lowered, as a persistently audible

ringing is a sure sign of an empty dwelling.

August is also an ideal time for home repairs as Village departments are often less busy.

If you plan any major projects while away, kindly alert your neighbors so they can adjust outdoor plans accordingly.

Should you need a bulk pickup due to renovation, just schedule on our Village website.

Also, please consider sidewalk repairs this summer as well as hedge trimming. Bushes/ trees hanging over sidewalk obstruct passage forcing pedestrians to walk in the road and limit drivers' line of sight. Due to the heavy rains of late, we have noticed an unprecedented amount of overgrowth as well as broken sidewalks, which are the responsibility of the adjacent homeowner.

August is also synonymous with capital projects in the Village with road repaving topping the list.

Almost \$300,000 will be spent on road resurfacing in the coming weeks. While the final list is under discussion based the funding allocation, parts of Pondfield Road and Summit Avenue as well as Oakledge Road, Wood End Lane and Cedar Street have been prioritized.

The decision on which streets are to be repaved is determined by our Public Works professionals based on the age of the road surface, amount of traffic, state of disrepair and location in the Village.

Even if your street is not on the final repaving list, all potholes will be addressed.

Please alert Village Hall if you think your street should be on the paving list going forward as we catalog all requests and inspect accordingly.


Yard waste and grass clippings will be picked up on a regular basis throughout the summer. We encourage you to "grass cycle" by leaving clippings on the lawn as it truly does add nutrients in a natural way.

If you choose to dispose of clippings, kindly help our DPW by bagging the clippings as not only are the piles unsightly, but more importantly, after an even gentle storm, they end up clogging our drainage system.

Additional capital projects in various stages of completion include:

- Our new Sagamore Park play equipment has been installed and ready for use.
- The new Maltby Recreation area is progressing on time with a projected opening of mid-September.
- The permanent design changes to the Westside Circle are being completed, thanks to input from neighboring businesses and residents, with bids expected to be finalized before the end of the summer.
- All of the crosswalks in the business district will be re-striped before Labor Day
- Replacement of our iconic and historical

- wrought iron street signs will be seen in various neighborhoods thanks to a partnership with the Bronxville Historical Conservancy.
- Designs are being finalized for storm water improvements at the Scout Field outfall, Hamilton and Sussex Avenue neighborhood and the Crawford Avenue drainage basin.
- We just learned from the County that the bridge to be replaced down at the County Park near the duck pond has been fabricated and I am awaiting a date of installation. Special thanks go to our County Legislator, James Nolan, who was relentless in advocating for its installation.
- The Metro North Bridge on Pondfield Road will also see long-awaited rehabilitation including repairing, sanding and painting of support beams and concrete ceiling removal. Projected to commence by September, it should be completed mostly on Saturdays through the fall to minimize traffic congestion.
- As a final reminder, on September 1st, the Village wide speed limit, save for Route 22 which is a state road, will decrease to 25mph putting us in sync with our neighboring communities.
- Village Hall is open all summer from 9am to 4pm and we are always available to assist.



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

Curbing Use of Single-Use Foodware Takes Effect

In a significant step towards environmental sustainability, Westchester County is reminding residents and business owners of its "Upon Request" single-use foodware law, that took effect on September 2. This legislation aims to reduce the consumption of single-use plastics by promoting a more mindful approach to their usage within food service establishments by limiting the use of single-use foodware products to only when specifically requested by the customer.

Westchester County Executive George Latimer was joined by the Westchester County Legislators Vice-Chair Nancy Barr, Legislator Erika Pierce, DoH and DEF as they outline the key tenets of this new law. The Board of Legislators took up this effort and passed legislation spearheaded by Barr and Pierce and signed by Latimer.

Latimer said: "Westchester County is once again taking steps to lessen the waste we put back into the waste stream. From large scale measures to simple changes in our daily behavior, every little bit counts toward our goal of leaving a cleaner planet for future generations."

The key tenets of the law include:

- Effective September 2, no food service establishment within Westchester County may provide single-use foodware or condiment packets to dine-in or take-away customers unless expressly requested. This pertains to items such as forks, knives, spoons, chopsticks, cup sleeves, beverage lids and condiment packets.
- Upon customer request, single-use foodware items or condiment packets must be provided individually, rather than in packages containing multiple items. This initiative is aimed at curbing unnecessary plastic waste and promoting a more sustainable approach to dining.
- The law applies across various ordering methods, including in-person, online and through food delivery apps. Customers are encouraged to ask for single-use items only when needed, fostering responsible consumption.
- Single-use plastic beverage stirrers and "splash sticks" will no longer be permitted within food service establishments. Retail stores may still offer these items for sale to their customers.
 - The legislation upholds existing protocols

for utensil storage within food service establishments, maintaining standards of cleanliness and sanitation. Utensils available in self-service containers for consumers must be individually wrapped or placed face-down, with single-item dispensers recommended.

- All DoH requirements for health and safety remain in full effect, ensuring that the well-being of patrons is not compromised.
- DEF and DoH Inspectors will collaboratively work to ensure the proper implementation and adherence to the new regulations, promoting a seamless transition for both establishments and customers.
- Food service establishments are required to prominently display a clearly legible sign informing customers that plastic utensils, condiments, and straws are available only upon request. This sign, provided by the County, will serve to increase awareness and encourage responsible plastic use.

DoH Commissioner Dr. Sherlita Amler said: "The Westchester County Department of Health is proud to support this new law. Protecting the environment and reducing waste is the cornerstone of Environmental Health. We know that this is an important step in helping to maintain a healthy environment for our residents.

DEF Deputy Commissioner Lou Vetrone said: "Billions of single-use plastic items end up in our waste stream every year. Due to the small size and narrow shape of these materials, they are not easily recyclable. Fortunately, County Executive Latimer and the Board of Legislators have taken decisive action to significantly reduce the amount of single-use plastic items in our waste with the enactment of this legislation. The Department of Environmental Facilities looks forward to working with the Department of Health to educate residents and food service establishments on the new requirements and to ensure compliance."

As we collectively strive towards a greener and more sustainable future, Westchester County's "Upon Request" single-use foodware law sets a precedent for responsible consumption and environmental stewardship within the food service industry.

Charlotte loved to visit her extended family in Ukraine, and traveled to Brazil and Europe with friends and family. She was always up for an adventure. She enjoyed concerts, plays, and art. She often attended art openings, gallery shows, and artist meetings. She loved experiencing everyone's art including making her own. Charlotte was the life of every party. Her spirit will continue to be felt with every toast, carol, and family meal.

Charlotte leaves her beloved husband, Alex Voznesenskiy and daughter, Zara, to continue spreading love and making memories. She also leaves her mother, PJ; brothers Henri (Jacki) and James (Katrina) Mouquin; mother-in-law Tanya Hoffmann; niece Keira, nephew Marc, and many aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends to remember her. 





you back to where it all began and takes you on the ride of a lifetime with the songs you came to love.


In addition to their mainstage productions, the nonprofit venue has a host of great one-night-only concerts, comedians and provides rental space to other local organizations.




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Toonerville Music Festival Returns for Third Year with Spin Doctors

Spin Doctors, the alternative rock band known for their hit songs "Two Princes" and "Little Miss Can't Be Wrong," will headline the non-profit and volunteer run 2023 Tooner-ville Music Festival on September 23 in Pelham, now in its third year. Ticket sales through toonerville.org are already outpacing last year, festival organizers reported.

The festival is named for the Toonerville Folks comic strip inspired by the trolley that once carried commuters up and down Pelham's main street to and from the train station. Residents can re-experience the historic trolley on the day of the festival as it transports concert goers and makes a continuous loop in Pelham for the event's duration. Additional live acts will perform on the trolley, entertaining riders throughout the

The Great Western Staircase at the New York State Capitol is a monumental interior stair, which was constructed of elaborately carved Corsehill sandstone. It was carved between 1884 and 1898. The only modern carving that has occurred at the stair was to correct the misspelling of Frederick Douglass' name in 2019. The staircase includes intricate carvings of flora, fauna, symbols, and the faces of named great Americans, including the first 30 governors of New York State, United States presidents, explorers, politicians, inventors, scientists, authors, soldiers, poets, activists, and abolitionists.

There are portraits of six other women carved on the Great Western Staircase, all below the second floor:

- Molly Pitcher, Revolutionary War soldier
- Harriet Beecher Stowe, author of Uncle Tom's Cabin
- · Susan B. Anthony, suffragist leader
- · Clara Barton, Civil War nurse
- Elmina P. Spencer, Civil War nurse
- Frances E. Willard, temperance crusader

Summer's Wave Goodbye

It's hard to believe that summer is just about over. Now that you will be spending less time going to the beach and participating in other outdoor activities, perhaps you will spend some more time on your indoor to-do list, including getting your estate planning affairs in order. Here are some tips to help you make this happen:

Review your plan. If you already have an estate plan, take out your documents, read them, and make sure you understand how they work. Make certain that the people you have appointed to make decisions for you in case something happens to you are still appropriate. If you are satisfied with your choices, contact those people to confirm that they still wish to serve in the role that you have appointed them for. Make sure you know where your original will is located. It is usually advisable to have your lawyer hold onto this since, under New York law, if the will was in your possession at the time of your death and it cannot be found, it is considered to be revoked and this will complicate the probate process. You also want to ensure that your beneficiaries and family members are correctly named. Consider whether you want to make changes to your healthcare directives. For example, does your healthcare directive say anything about ventilators or machines that provide breathing assistance? Think about what kind of quality of life is acceptable to you.

If you have a trust, confirm that it is properly funded. Often, clients come to us with trusts created by others, and they think the trust is fully funded, but it is not. This is often overlooked since it was not clearly defined whose responsibility it was to fund the trust. You will need to check that new deeds have been done for real estate that you want the trust to own, as well as check titles on bank accounts and other financial assets. Beneficiary designations should also be reviewed to ensure they are up to date. If this is not done correctly, then the people who you want to receive your property when you pass away may not be the ones to get it.

Tangible personal property. Believe it or not, many of the disputes we see regarding wills and estates involve personal property or

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items with sentimental value. Sometimes emotions get the better of people and they fight over certain items, even if it doesn't make financial sense to do so. This type of mindset can cost everyone more money. If you make your wishes clear in your estate planning documents, this can help minimize the chances of a dispute. You might even wish to consider speaking to your family members about how you wish to distribute certain items in your estate.

Funeral/burial wishes. Make sure your family knows what your wishes are in this regard. If you have purchased a prepaid funeral plan, let them know. If you have not purchased a prepaid plan, consider doing so. Prepaid funeral plans are a way for you to pay in advance for your funeral at today's prices and make things easier for your loved ones when you pass away.

List of advisors. Prepare an updated list of all your advisors, including your estate planning attorney, accountant, financial advisor, insurance professional, clergy, etc.

Do a financial inventory. Prepare a list of all accounts, credit cards, insurance policies, income sources, real estate, and other assets that you own. Make sure to list the financial institution, the account numbers, and the approximate balance. For accounts with online access, include the username and password.

Start getting rid of your junk. You do not need to retain bank statements, pay stubs, utility bills, etc. for your entire lifetime. PLEASE do your loved ones a favor and start shredding all that excess paper!

If you don't have an estate plan, what are you waiting for? The time to act is now. You can always make changes along the way if your life circumstances change.

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
